On Sunday mornings we will stream Morning Prayer at 10:00 am each week through at least February 17. If the infection rate falls to a level that I judge to be safe, then we will consider returning to in-person worship in the parish hall. Hopefully we will have an early Spring and will also be able to return to outdoor worship.



# LENT

## The Holy Season of Lent

Lent is a season to prepare for the coming of Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, forty days (not counting Sundays) before Easter. Ash Wednesday is a day to pray, listen to God and turn away from our sins. It is a time to make a new start in life, committing to let the life and love of God be our guide.

During Lent we take on disciplines or practices that will help us in this journey. The Book of Common Prayer calls us to self-examination and repentance, prayer, fasting and self-denial, and reading and mediating on God's holy Word. The point is not to earn credit for these practices but to allow them to shape our lives more and more in God's image.

As you can imagine, this year Lent will look different. Because of the current spread of Covid-19, we will not have an in-person Ash Wednesday service. We will however have a virtual service on Facebook Live on February 17 at noon. We will not, however, have the imposition of Ashes. The Prayer book actually makes the imposition optional. But we will hear God's Word and join in prayer together. The service will be streamed at noon but you can watch it at any point after that time.

Beginning February 18, we will have a short service of daily prayers each morning (except Sundays) at 8:30 am on Facebook Live. This will be a short version of Morning Prayer. These prayers will come from the Lent Prayer booklet that we have used in the past. We will have different prayers for each day of the week. These will be led by a variety of people. We will have copies of these prayer booklets for you to use during Lent. You may pick them up at the Church or you can print the electronic version yourself.

Also as part of our Lent Observance we will have a parish wide food collection for the food Bank at the Fort Mill Care Center. Giving to others is a good way to grow closer to God. We will distribute a list of food items to be collected for each day of Lent. We ask that you place the food in the food cart outside the Church on Sunday each week. Then we will take a photo of the food collected that week and post it on Facebook.

## **Shrove Tuesday**

This year, since we cannot gather in person, we will not be able to have our traditional Shrove Tuesday pancake supper. However, we will still find a way to celebrate Shrove Tuesday. Make pancakes at home. (We will have a recipe available if you need one.) Make funny shapes. Decorate your table with Mardi Gras colors and beads. Take pictures of your feast and post them on St. Paul's Facebook page. If you are not able to access the page you can email the pictures to the church and we will post them on Facebook for you.

## **Parish Family Gatherings**

In the midst of all we have experienced this past year, sometimes we start to feel alone. So during Lent, we're going to have some fun together. This might sound contrary to Lent (it's supposed to be somber), but this year we need the joy of fellowship with God's people! So each Sunday afternoon we'll get together on Zoom at 4:00. One week we'll play a game together. The next week we'll watch a movie together. I hope that you will block out your Sunday afternoons for some fun with your parish family. After all, though we pray and fast during Lent, every Sunday is a "little" Easter and filled with Easter joy! If you have a game that would work for a group, please let me know. I'm looking specifically for Outburst, Taboo, and Scattergories. Also, if you have any DVD movies that you think our whole parish family would enjoy, please let me know. We will start our fun February 21.

## 2020 Financials

Included in this Epistle is a 2 page report showing the church's financial results by month for 2020. This is one of the financial reports shared with the Vestry at their monthly meeting. Rev. Sally has some financial comments about 2020 elsewhere in this month's Epistle.

Separately, this month's Epistle includes a summary of giving for 2020 and compares this to both the 2020 Statement of Mission (SOM or budget) and 2019. Giving in 2020 fell short of expectations and what the Vestry anticipated. The coronavirus pandemic clearly had a material impact on planned giving in 2020. On a more positive note, giving was not down significantly from 2019 - less than 2%. As a parish, we were able to maintain giving at a level comparable to 2019 in spite of the pandemic's headwinds. Thanks to any and all who were able to give to support the work of St. Paul's in 2020. Looking ahead, the 2021 Stewardship campaign so far suggests the pandemic may have a more material impact on giving in 2021.

## *Some More about Paradise . . .*

As we have previously noted, our neighboring community known as Paradise has historic roots, having been founded in 1895 as Fort Mill's first organized Black community. Although it was a thriving working-class neighborhood by 1925, Paradise began to decline when unemployment surged during the recession that accompanied the closing of many of the area textile mills later in the century. Today the Paradise residents continue to be largely African American, and many remain deeply attached to their community. Sadly, however, the neighborhood has for years dealt with conditions related to economic hardship and an aging population such as dilapidated housing and decaying water lines.

As far back as the 1970s, some federal funds and private grants were made available for addressing some of these issues. Habitat for Humanity has also helped with home repairs. But much more is needed.

In 2019, a descendant of one of the freed slaves who founded Paradise, Danielle Watts-Redmond, founded a non-profit organization intended to

- Keep Paradise historically sustainable

- Proactively preserve the people and property of paradise

- Help the neighborhood preserve its cultural identity.

The Foundation has articulated four "pillars" for revitalizing Paradise

- Wellness: physical, mental, emotional, spiritual, and financial

- Community

- Diet and Nutrition

- Learning/Education

With the help of volunteers and financial grants the Foundation helps with home repairs, provides meals for neighborhood seniors, tutors local children, and maintains a clothing cupboard, among other endeavors. Now the organization has outgrown its space in a local church and is looking for better facilities.

The Mission and Outreach Committee is currently exploring ways in which we might reach out to our Paradise neighbors. Meanwhile we would like to encourage you to go to the Historic Paradise Foundation's Facebook Home page where you can find more information about their activities and ways to help.

The Mission and Outreach Committee is so grateful for the ways in which so many of you have reached out to share God's love with our neighbors, both personally and through St. Paul's outreach initiatives. ## Christian Education - Children & Youth

What is Lent and how do you explain it to children?

For the most part, children are concrete thinkers. Around ten years of age, they begin to grapple with conceptual thinking. The physiological development of the areas of the brain necessary to build conceptual thinking continues to between ages 25-27.

When stimulated, synapses (and other scientific things I cannot spell) will make connections so we can build upon the foundation established and begin a lifetime of expand our conceptual thinking. This takes place during and after physical growth stops.

I liken this process to building highways. Prepping the site to become a roadbed is the first labor intensive job. Containing pre and post water flow is built. Painstaking leveling is next followed by the combination of rebar and concrete to create the highway surface. Lastly the crash guards; directional, informational, and speed limit signs; are installed, the highway dedication takes place and the ribbon is cut.

In the midst of their growing brains come the questions - What is Lent? Do we have to give up something? Where is God in all this? How did Jesus end up on the cross? Who are the apostles? Why don't we say, "Alleluia?"

So, what is Lent? Presence. Presence imbues reassurance, support, confidence, comfort, acceptance ... "We love because he first loved us." (1 John 4:19). We are presence because Jesus was our Presence on Earth.

Lent is about Presence; humans' conditional presence and God's unconditional Presence. God *is* Presence. God doesn't hear; God listens. God is more than sympathy; God is compassion. God is not another "Just Do It," Nike ad; God lets us know we "can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Phil 4:13)

The Jesus we meet in the Year B – RCL is the tough-love, reality checking Jesus. It's not all the feel good stories with beautiful scenery though the first Sunday in Lent begins with the Baptism of Jesus in all its glory with the voice from heaven and the dove. That; however, quickly becomes Jesus who came to Earth as a man, would suffer like a man, a man who entered the desert for 40 days to be tempted by the devil, the Jesus who said, "If any of you really want to follow me, you have to put your own wants aside, and walk with me carrying your cross... Don't be ashamed of me and what I've taught you, and I won't be ashamed of you when I return in glory with the angels at the end." This is the Jesus who acknowledged he was a bit unnerved by his looming crucifixion. (quotes from *God's Word, My Voice: A Lectionary for Children*, Church Publishing)

I recommend two books for children/youth *and* adults that provide insights into Lent. Please remember that these publications were written prior to COVID-19 so there are sections which show us in church.

***Making Room*** – Paraclete Press, ISBN: 978-1612616593

Lent can be hard for children. It's travels through frightening places, loaded with themes of self-denial and death. How can children approach this season in a way that is meaningful and not frightening? *Make Room* presents Lent as a special time for creating a welcoming space for God. *Make Room* uniquely connects its projects to the story of Jesus. Simple and practical activities such as baking bread, having a neighbor over for dinner, uncluttering your room, and watching less TV become acts of justice and kindness, part of a life of following and imitating Christ, and a way to make room for God in our lives and in the world around us.

This unique book integrates themes of hospitality and self-giving that echo Jesus' ministry, Jesus' entire life and invites children to wonder about the story, to encounter Lent with all their senses, and to experience activities in Lent as part of a life of discipleship.

***What We Do in Lent*** - Morehouse Publishing, ISBN: 978-0819222787) Fun activities that teach children and their families about the holy season of Lent. Includes family Lenten devotionals. Suitable for any Christian denomination that follows the liturgical calendar. These fun-filled activities for home, pew, or church school, help children ages 4-7 learn about the seasons of Lent and Easter. This book includes mazes, crossword puzzles, connect the dots, and more. 41 pages of activities and a 4-page parent guide designed to promote parenting in the pews.
