## Walking the Path of Life

A few weeks ago, while I was away on vacation at Lake Junaluska, I had the opportunity to walk the prayer labyrinth near the Chapel. A labyrinth is a path that winds around in a circle. Some people compare it to a maze. But unlike a maze, there are no choices on the path. Eventually if you follow the path, it ends in the center. It reminds us of our lives and our journey toward God. There are points in our life journey when we are close to God, close to the center of life. And there are times when we are far away.

This labyrinth is near the lake and the lake is home to many geese, especially in the summer. These geese obviously like to visit the labyrinth too, because as I walked the path, I was constantly confronted with goose poop. At first, I was aggravated by the distraction. I wanted to be spiritual in that moment. I wanted to pray and yet it seemed that I was constantly having to step around the poop. Then it hit me. This is a metaphor for life. Life is filled with goose poop. Life is filled with problems, conflicts, health concerns and other issues that threaten to keep us from living the life that God wants for us. If we let them, they will keep us from living a life focused on loving God and loving each other.

But we don't have to let it. On the labyrinth at Lake Junaluska I made the decision to simply step around the poop. I couldn't ignore it. If I did my shoes would have been really messy. But instead I simply choose to not make it my focus. I kept my focus on moving forward on the path. We can do the same with our lives. If we will keep our focus on God and his call for us, then we can step around the poop and leave it behind.

## Outdoor Worship

Beginning on Saturday June 27, and the second and fourth Saturday of each month afterward, we will have worship at 7:00pm in our parking lot. If it rains, our "rain date" will be the next day (Sunday) at 7:00pm. We will gather for Evening Prayer with a sermon and Steav singing hymns (the congregation will not be singing.) We invite you to bring your own portable lawn chair and a face mask. We will all need to be very aware of our distancing. We must keep 6 feet between people of different household. The restrooms will not be open so please come prepared for that. And when you arrive, you will be instructed to park on the street so that we can fit as many as possible in the parking lot. #### Déjà vu, God, History, and Writing

When I wrote my June newsletter article, I had no idea I should have ended it with - To be continued. I had talked about copying my big sister's handwriting because her penmanship was excellent, pretty, and I wanted to be like her. I also talked about writing my prayers as a way to perfect my forgery of her handwriting. I chuckled as I wrote that and remembered how I irritated her because I always wanted to do everything she did.

The following week I was going through a box of my mother's mementos. Momma kept most every sheet of paper imaginable - Lou's birth cost Momma and Daddy 50¢ and my first baby checkup was \$1.75. I'm not *that* old so I determined that my parents had good insurance. This box; however, was different. There were cards and letters from friends and family and I realized she kept only greeting cards in which the sender had written something beyond the proverbial salutation and a signature.

What a gift it was to learn the many special things Momma did for others. How wonderful to read the expressions of love and appreciation that had been shared with Momma. I hit the jackpot with the handmade cards that Lou, Bill, and I had created. Lou's were meticulously created with her beautiful artwork. Bill's cards were adorable, most having lots of cotton balls in various shapes (Santa's beard, clouds, etc.) glued to now faded construction paper. Most cherished are the individual letters each of us had written to Momma beginning with those from summer camp when we were in elementary school.

Then there was a bundle of school papers and report cards. Lou's grades were as pleasing as her penmanship and my grades caused as much cringing as my penmanship. Between some report cards was an English assignment Lou had written. I opened the folded paper to find an essay entitled "My Pet Peeve". Simultaneously I began laughing as I heard myself say, "This'll be good!"

I don't think I need to tell you who was the Pet Peeve. I could envision her expressions as she wrote, "Janie (nickname used by family members, ONLY), is an annoyance because she copies everything I do. She is a spoiled brat though she can be kind when I am upset. As soon as she thinks I am alright, she's right back to being the Queen of Sheba!" There were times of tears and laughter as I spent the afternoon propped against a piece of family heirloom furniture, with a glass of wine that had magically appeared, and began a trip of discovery down Memory Lane for which I am still thanking God.

The news over the past few weeks expanded my Memory Lane trip. I remembered that many of the prayers I had written included the civil unrest, daily death tolls, violence, our government's responses to the current crises (Vietnam War, Civil Rights Movement, Women's Liberation, etc.), and what should be the appropriate use of the military and National Guard in our cities, streets, parks, and on campuses. God heard about my fears, confusion, anger, frustration and disappointment. It was during that time, I had the gut wrenching realization that my parents could not protect me from everything though they would have died trying.

Now, our youth are experiencing for the first time my disturbing déjà vu. Never could I have imagined our youth experiencing civil unrest, daily death tolls, violence, our government's responses to the current crises, and the appropriate role of our military and National Guard in our cities, streets, and parks. My heart and prayers are with them. I do not have an adjective to express how I feel that yet another generation of youth is being flooded with adult-produced issues that only exacerbate the usual growing pains of youth. Adding insult to injury, our youth cannot or are restricted in being with friends, going to church and school, participating in vacations, events, celebrations, and extra-curricular activities. It makes me wonder what they would divulge in letters to God.

I am the only one left of my birth family to tell my great nieces and their parents what it was like growing up with Lou, Bill, Momma and Daddy, and my grandmothers; about living in a small, south Georgia town in the 1960s; how frightened I was by what I heard on the radio, saw on the Huntley-Brinkley Report, read in the Tifton Gazette, Newsweek, U. S. News and World Report, and what I learned by eavesdropping on the conversations between adults.

I will share the fun things like how we had to hide the tool boxes because Bill loved to take things apart. Then there was the trip to the farm when the bull shoved his head through the window of our Volkswagen Bug and my father said, "Let's hope he doesn't sneeze!" He did snorted (gross), looked at each of us, then pulled his head out and walked away. Oh, yes, there are the adventures with Lou's science projects - the mice, the bugs; the turtles, tadpoles and, the snakes.

They should know about the precious family keepsakes we lost when our house burned and how the people in our community became God's hands and feet as they helped us through this tragedy. Most importantly, I want them to know the ways in which each of us experienced God and what I know of the importance of faith in each of our lives.

All this led me to send letters to my great nieces. Emily, my oldest great niece, said she would write me but it would be a text. I told her I love hearing from her anyway and anytime followed by, "I'm not really sure how I would put text messages in my memory box." I will be sending pretty stationery, including self-addressed, stamped envelopes to both girls along with a journal available for their letters to God.

**Our Classroom Ready school supply drive** has been our summer focus for a number of years, and we have recently received a request to help again this year.
