Ahhhh, September! Opportunities are Knocking - and we need them!

September has always seemed to me an opportunity to reflect on pre-summer life and what improvements and changes I wanted to make. In some ways, this September may not bring quite the opportunities I had hoped for but I am looking on the bright side, thinking *different doesn't mean better or worse; it just means different and normal (especially new normal) doesn't always feel good*. If nothing else, we have opportunities to normalize what we have thought of as our new normal.

When we think about it, *normal* is always changing. There is the normal we have before and after the normal we create when we implement a lesson Jesus provided us. The normal we have before and the normal created after a child is born into a family. Normal changes when someone in our family develops food allergies, when someone in our family becomes ill and certainly when a loved one dies.

I must say that most of the time I have had to recreate *normal* I resist the change. Why? Fear. Grief. I don't know what to do, how to do what needs to be done, and afraid I will do something wrong. Even if I wasn't comfortable with the way things had been going, I was at least familiar enough with that *normal* to know what to expect. Add to those, I am already tired and I just don't feel like it. With a lot of prayer and support I begin to *make the best of a bad situation*.

This September we begin with the opportunities to recreate *normal* but these will be within confines that have lessened the flexibility we have known before. I read a piece of advice from General McCrystal that seems unexpectedly appropriate for our current situation - "Fight the battle that is in front of you; not the one you want," and Mister Rogers says, "Find the helpers." God is our #1 helper, instructs us to "pray without ceasing," to, "love your neighbor as yourself," and always remember that the most important thing is holding on tightly to "...the greatest of these is love."

Most every cliché has an equivalent in the Bible. God has provided us with the opportunity of choice, his commands and sayings to encourage us when we need to accomplish the difficulties in life. The choice of how we employ these is what will turn the washboard dirt lane we find ourselves on into the narrow, but paved, two-lane and beyond as we choose.

Put into action as much as you can, whenever you can. When it is too much, just do your best to pray and be kind. Collectively things will improve for us all.

Pick your opportunities and enjoy! To God be the glory! Amen.

Classroom Ready

We continue to be so very grateful to each of you who has contributed to our Classroom Ready campaign. Thanks to you, we have more than met our commitment to provide 350 index cards and as well as to maintain their supply of tape. The latest count (as of August 18) was 374 packs of 4 x 6 index cards and 132 tape dispensers. We also want to say a huge "thank you" to the recent donor of \$100.00 toward the purchase of classroom supplies! Please keep the tape rolls (good quality in a dispenser, *not* refill rolls) coming as the need is ongoing.

Bethel Men's Warming Shelter Dinner

The shelter continues to serve meals every night to homeless men in the Rock Hill area. Parking Lot Tailgate

In July and August our dinner groups met on Friday nights in the Church's parking lot and had a tailgate dinner. We had a great time so we thought that in September we would open it to whoever wished to join us. We will meet on **Friday September 18 at 6:30 pm**. Bring your favorite picnic food for you and your family members. (We ask that people not share food). Bring a drink, utensils, an outdoor chair, a table if you like and whatever else you need to enjoy the party. We will spread out in the parking lot, keeping 6 feet between us, and enjoy each other's company. Also, please wear a facemask when not eating.

Streaming Technology

Because of the advances that have been made over recent years, we are able to continue to worship over the internet during this crisis. That has been a real blessing. However, I need help. I am having trouble being both liturgist/preacher and internet operator. It would be very beneficial for me to have a team of people who would be responsible for the internet set up on Sunday mornings. I know we have people in the parish who are more proficient than I am with the various platforms. I would hope that we could find two or three people to form a team and rotate being present on Sunday mornings to manage the streaming of the liturgy. This would take a great load off my shoulders. Introduction to Paradise

No, not that Paradise. Our own Fort Mill Paradise! Many of you surely already know about the Paradise community, but I lived in this area for several years before I ever even heard of it. Others like me may not be aware that Paradise lies next door to the neighborhood that includes St. Paul's. Paradise was born in 1895 with the sale of a tract of land to Bethlehem Baptist Church trustees who developed it into Fort Mill's first organized black community. Settled by former slaves who became teachers, tradesmen, and craftspeople, Paradise became a thriving working class neighborhood. In 1925 Fort Mill's first all-black public school, the George Fish Colored School, was constructed on Steele Street and became the center of the community which boasted a youth baseball team, a band and a variety of civic groups.

When textile manufacturing began to decline in the Carolinas and mills began to close, Paradise, like many other communities, was affected by job loss and economic decline. In the late 1970s the school was shut down. A few years later the building was destroyed and replaced by a Duke Energy facility. The Paradise neighborhood center was gone, and the people began to leave too.

Today Paradise is struggling. Most of its houses are old; and many require electrical upgrades, new plumbing, and other repairs. Most residents are black and aging with only low to moderate incomes, many living on less than \$3,000 a month. As Fort Mill prospers and property values rise, many Paradise homeowners face the possibility of tax increases above their ability to pay. There is also concern that residents will be induced to sell to developers, leading to the loss of the neighborhood's historic identity.

The people of Paradise are our St. Paul's neighbors, and the Mission and Outreach Committee would like to make them also our friends. We are currently exploring ways in which we might come to know them better and possibly work with them to address some of their needs. Please stay tuned for further developments!
