Welcome to the season of Easter! Many people think that when the day of Easter is passed, Easter is over. But for us Easter last for fifty days. The New Testament tells us that there were fifty days between the day of Jesus' resurrection and the Day of Pentecost. During this time Jesus appeared to his disciples to strengthen them, to guide them and to offer them hope. The same is true for us. Even in the midst of our current crisis, Christ is risen. Our God is stronger than death. And he is here among us, offering strength, guidance and hope.

On Sundays, we continue to worship the Lord with a liturgy streamed live over Facebook at 8:00am. We still will not have an 'in-person' service at the church as Bishop Waldo has extended the suspension of in-person worship through May 31. But we are worshipping together each Sunday. It is not ideal. I miss seeing all of you. But we are fortunate that we are able to connect through technology. On Tuesday, April 28, at 11:00am we restarted our Bible study using Zoom, an internet-based connection service. Current members should have received an email, however, if you have not been contacted and would like to be added, please contact me and I will get the login info to you. We are continuing our study in the gospel of John using the book <u>Drawn into the Mystery of Jesus through the Gospel of John</u> by Jean Vanier.

I know that during this time, many are feeling cut off from their Church. We are making an effort to contact people in various ways. If you would like to have someone call you weekly, please let me know and that will happen. We don't want anyone to feel that they are alone.

Many have asked about ways to serve. We are building a resource list. For example, you may be willing to pick up and deliver groceries for those who should not be outside of the house, even for necessities. "What do you say during a time like this?"

Countless journalists, commentators, and news program hosts have been heard making this statement. I got wise after a bit, turned off the television, and picked up the phone to talk with a friend in need. Then I heard that phrase in my own mind! I hung up before completing the call feeling like I needed to give this some thought, "What *would I say* during a time like this?

I began thinking how my mother always seemed to have just the right thing to say. Profound. Simple. But never simplistic. I have heard Momma repeating three of her oddly comforting gems quite often over these past weeks.

"Normal doesn't always feel good."

- "Just because something is different doesn't make it right or wrong; it just means it's
- different."
- "God's there. Keep looking."

Before I turned off the television, I heard a reporter say, "What do you say at a time like this?" I feel the phrase, 'These are unprecedented times,' is over used and losing its meaning; however, I don't know any other way to express it. So, I say to you, 'These *are* unprecedented times and I thank you for allowing us into your homes to consider them.'" I said a prayer, called my friend, and we used many God-given words and I share some of them with you...

God. Thoughts. Prayers. You. Family. Forgiveness. Help. Grateful. Birds singing. Children. Joy. Nature. Walking. Sharing. Friends, Loving. Time. Peacefulness. Fear. Meaning. Hope. Music. Thank you. How can I help? Appreciation. Essential workers. Neighbors. Volunteers. Tears. Smile. Loneliness. Caring. Insight. Take care of yourself. Wash your hands. Call me. Hello, how are you?

Happy Easter! In our last newsletter I said, "I *need* Easter. I *really need* Easter. The service Rev. Sally provided was lovely, reassuring, needed, and the culmination of my Easter "celebration," but the season of Easter continues with renewal and joy.

Jesus' focus was on giving the ultimate for others on that first Easter. My Easter hardly compares but it did include doing for others. Having heard the hardships of our families, especially parents, are experiencing, it was apparent that a little something was needed.

Off to the craft closet at the church I went. With pre-printed diagrams and some instructions I began gathering supplies. Then I saw popsicle sticks, pompons, pipe cleaners in colors from neon orange to Christmas green and many colors in between. Then there was tissue paper, brads, clothes pins, string, and a few prompts for some ways these supplies could be used; even a way to incorporate nature the entire family.

My plan was to mail the packets, but the post office wanted the items in a box and not flopping around in an envelope. Well, the post office doesn't concern itself with Christian education budgets, so... Plan B. With the aid of technology, I input the addresses for the families and off to some 18 homes I went. Me, the envelopes,

directions, hand sanitizer, and face masks!

I needed the surprised looks, the jumping children, the smiles, the stories, the waves, the, "I love you, Ms. Jane," screamed from the interior side of a storm door followed by a slobbery kiss on the glass (mom was probably at the door with Windex before I was out of the neighborhood). In doing something for others, I received far more than I gave. I *needed* Easter. I *really needed* Easter . In giving I *did* receive. Easter was received in abundance!

I got it in the form of love, laughter, and joy. In the days after the resurrection, Jesus told his followers to spread the Good News. They did just that and it is still being spread - I saw it on the faces of each person visited. It was the Easter I needed. The Easter I *really needed*. Alleluia! Alleluia!

You should be able to use your bank's bill pay feature to send contributions to St. Paul's. Most banks' bill pay services are free to both the sender and the receiver, unlike online credit card payment processors such as Pay-Pal. From a review of online bill pay functionality at Bank of America and Wells Fargo, it appears the account number field can be used as a memo field. For those of you who have pledged for 2020, if there is no indication on the contribution/memo line, it will be applied to your 2020 pledge.

SERVING OUR NEIGHBORS: MISSION AND OUTREACH AT ST. PAUL'S

He has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor . . . *release to the captives and the regaining of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.* Luke 4:18-19

We are encouraged to stay home and avoid personal contact with others as much as possible. However, there are still many ways in which we can serve our neighbors. Loneliness and anxiety are increasing among some of those who are socially isolated; and economic hardship is sure to intensify as many jobs, hopefully only temporarily, disappear. We can each stay in touch with family, friends, and neighbors by checking in on a regular basis via the telephone, Skype or Facetime, email, snail mail. If you are healthy and able, offer to help with needed shopping or other errands. There is now a list of those wo are willing to help at the church. Please call Kim our parish secretary at 803.547.5968 and she will get you the names and numbers. Continue to donate food and other necessary items to the **Fort Mill Care Center**, either directly or by means of our parish grocery cart -which is still available outside the door to the parish hall. <u>At this time they are in need of: canned fruit, pasta, and canned pasta sauce. (Please no glass jars)</u>

Make financial donations to service agencies such as the **Care Center**, **Bethel Men's Warming Center**, **Food for the Poor**, etc. Contact the **American Red Cross** about donating blood. Contribute to **Kanuga Conference Center**. Kanuga, a long time Episcopal Institution, is facing a financial crisis in the midst of the pandemic and they need our help. Make a contribution to the **Episcopal Relief and Development Pandemic Response** effort. You can donate at www.episcopalrelief.org Also consider making a contribution to the **Food for the Poor Emergency Appeal**. You may remember that Food for the Poor is a ministry to those in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Think creatively about how you can continue to support local small businesses that you may normally patronize and not least, Pray!
